

Information Regarding the Physical Portion of the Senior Project and Fair Night

The Project Itself

What will you display? That depends on your situation.

- 3D project (Hands-on type project)
 - If your physical project was a hands-on type of project, then bring it in (car, duck blind, doghouse, computer, quilt, dress, model of a human spine, etc.) and have a tri-fold poster describing what you did.
- Volunteer at a non-for-profit organization (Day care, church, parks and recreation, animal shelter, police department, YMCA, etc.)
 - If you volunteered your time, the tri-fold poster will play a much more significant role. You need to be very detailed about what you did, how many hours you gave of you time, and what you learned about the organization for which you gave your time. Handouts (brochures, pamphlets, etc.) should also be displayed.
- Teach a class (elementary, middle school, high school, community group, church organization, etc.)
 - While a tri-fold poster is important, material used for your presentation will be vital. The materials may include the following: pre-test, post-test, handouts, PowerPoint presentation, models, notes, etc.
- Take a class (excluding one for East Noble credit) - Freedom Academy, one on one training (i.e. apprenticeship), science fair (which is completed above and beyond a regular science class).
 - A tri-fold poster which describes what you did and what you learned is important. Obviously, much of what you will display will be in the form of notes taken and handouts received.

Fair Night
